

Serjeant Richard Rounsley



Serjeant Richard Rounsley was born in Tanfield, County Durham, on 16 February 1886. He was one of eleven children born to Eli Rounsley and his wife Isabella. At the age of 15 Richard was already working in the mines and is recorded as having been a miner on his enlistment into the Army on 12 September 1914, shortly after the outbreak of the First World War.

On 29 August 1908, Richard married Ann Smith in Lanchester, County Durham. The couple had 4 children, William born on 22 March 1906, Eliza Joan born on 28 March 1909, Lily born on 8 August 1911 and Rhoda born on 22 February 1913.

Having enlisted at the outbreak of war, the then Private Rounsley was posted to 12th Battalion The Durham Light Infantry which had been formed in Newcastle-upon-Tyne. He arrived on the Western Front on 26 August 1915 with the battalion and quickly rose through the ranks being promoted to lance corporal on 19 December 1915, corporal on 14 January 1916 and serjeant on 27 June 1916. 12th Battalion The Durham Light Infantry took part in the fighting in the early days of the Battle of the Somme and on 8 July 1916 Serjeant Rounsley is recorded as having been wounded with shell shock.

At 12:00 hours on 3 October 1916, 12th Battalion The Durham Light Infantry moved into Crescent Alley southeast of Le Sars to relieve 5th Battalion The Northumberland Fusiliers. B Company was deployed to Blaydon Trench which was heavily shelled. The entrance to Crescent Alley and the Battalion HQ were also shelled. There was shelling again on 4 October.

On 5 October 1916 the battalion remained in Crescent Trench and the shelling continued. The War Diaries of 23rd Division record that there was heavy rain all day and the ground was 'practically impossible for military operations'. The bad weather and the deep mud made all movement difficult. The rain was

continuous between 2 and 6 October and 'the enemy's artillery fire daily increased in violence and accuracy.'

It was during the shelling on 5 October 1916 that Serjeant Rounsley and two other soldiers of 12th Battalion The Durham Light Infantry, Private Robert Walton and Private James Richardson, appear to have been killed.

In March 2021, the remains of three soldiers were found close to what had been the location of Blaydon Trench during the installation of a wind turbine. Two of these men had insigina of The Durham Light Infantry on them. They were found lying on top of each other in what appeared to have been a shell hole. After extensive research by the Joint Casualty and Compassionate Centre's Commemorations Team, one of the these men has been identified through DNA testing as Serjeant Rounsley. Work will continue to identify the second Durham Light Infantry soldier. Today we will remember Serjeant Richard Rounsley and he will be laid to rest alongside his two unknown comrades.

From 1916, fierce fighting took place on the battlefields of Warlencourt and Le Sars. The three casualties being laid to rest today, including Serjeant Richard Rounsley, were recovered from these former battlefields. Along with over 3,500 of their comrades, they will now be laid to rest in the Commonwealth War Graves Commission's Warlencourt British Cemetery, which was made in late 1919 when graves were brought in from the surrounding area. Over a third of the casualties buried here are sadly unidentified.

Serjeant Richard Rounsley est né à Tanfield, dans Durham, le 16 février 1886. Il était l'un des onze enfants nés à Eli Rounsley et sa femme Isabella. À l'âge de 15 ans, Richard travaillait déjà dans les mines et est enregistré comme mineur lors de son enrôlement dans l'armée le 12 septembre 1914, peu après le déclenchement de la Première Guerre mondiale.

Le 29 août 1908, Richard épousa Ann Smith à Lanchester, dans Durham. Le couple eut quatre enfants: William, né le 22 mars 1906, Eliza Joan, née le 28 mars 1909, Lily, née le 8 août 1911, et Rhoda, née le 22 février 1913.

Apres avoir enrôlé au début de la guerre, Private Rounsley fut affecté au 12° bataillon du Durham Light Infantry, qui avait été formé à Newcastle-upon-Tyne. Il est arrivé sur le front occidental le 26 août 1915 avec le bataillon et gravit rapidement les échelons, étant promu a lance corporal le 19 décembre 1915, corporal le 14 janvier 1916 et serjeant le 27 juin 1916. Le 12° bataillon du Durham Light Infantry a pris part aux combats au début de la bataille de la Somme et, le 8 juillet 1916, Serjeant Rounsley était répertorié blessé avec choc.

À midi, le 3 octobre 1916, le 12^e bataillon du Durham Light Infantry s'est déplacé vers Crescent Alley, au sud-est de Le Sars, pour relever le 5^e bataillon du Northumberland Fusiliers. B Company a été déployée dans la tranchée Blaydon, qui a été lourdement bombardée. L'entrée de Crescent Alley et le quartier général du bataillon ont également été bombardés. De nouveaux bombardements eurent lieu le 4 octobre.

Le 5 octobre 1916, le bataillon resta dans la tranchée Crescent et les bombardements se poursuivirent. Les journaux de guerre de la 23^e division indiquent qu'il pleuvait abondamment toute la journée et que le terrain était 'pratiquement impraticable pour les opérations militaires'. Le mauvais temps et la boue profonde rendaient tout déplacement difficile. La

pluie fut continue entre le 2 et le 6 octobre et 'les tirs d'artillerie ennemis gagnèrent chaque jour en violence et en précision'.

C'est pendant les bombardements du 5 octobre 1916 que le Serjeant Rounsley et deux autres soldats du 12^e bataillon du Durham Light Infantry, Private Robert Walton et Private James Richardson, semblent avoir été tués.

En mars 2021, les restes de trois soldats ont été découverts près de l'emplacement de l'ancienne tranchée Blaydon lors de l'installation d'une éolienne. Deux de ces hommes portaient l'insigne du Durham Light Infantry. Ils ont été retrouvés gisant l'un sur l'autre dans ce qui semblait être un cratère d'obus. Après des recherches approfondies menées par le Joint Casualty and Compassionate Centre, l'un de ces hommes a été identifié grâce à des tests ADN comme étant Serjeant Rounsley. Les travaux se poursuivront pour identifier le deuxième soldat du Durham Light Infantry. Aujourd'hui, nous nous nous souviendrons du Serjeant Richard Rounsley, qui reposera aux côtés de ses deux camarades inconnus.
