The Battle of Fromelles was a combined attack by British and Australian troops on 19-20 July 1916, in France, during the First World War. The aim of the operation was to seize the Germanbeld salient just north of the village of Fromelles.

It was the first offensive operation by the Australian Imperial Force on the Western Front and was intended to divert German troops as only the epic Bullet of the Sommer. The firsts and Australian attackers had little time to prepare and the odds greatly favoured the well-entreeted Comman. The high casualties from Australia's 5th Division, fighting alongside the British 61st Division, remind us that the battle remains the worst loss of life in a 24 hour period in Australia's history.

The remains of 250 Australian and British soldiers recovered from mass graves in 2009 were reinterred in the Fromelles (Phesant Wood) Military Cemetery, with full military honours, in 2010. A ceremony to dedicate the new cemetery occurred on 19 July 2010, the anniversary of the Battle of Fromelles, during which the dead of Phesant Wood gave their lives.

During the period of 2010 to 2014 Joint Australian and British Identification Boards identified one hundred and forty four (144) Australian soldiers by name.

From 2015 to 2019 the Australian Army's Fromelles Identification Boards identified a further twenty two (22) Australian soldiers by name. To date 166 Australian Soldiers who were killed during the Battle of Fromelles and buried here at Fromelles (Pheasant Wood) Military Cemetery have been identified.
