Service conducted by Reverend Richard Mutter CF Chaplain to 1st Battalion The Royal Welsh

The Cemetery

Named after a nearby farm, the Commonwealth War Grave Commission's Chester Farm Cemetery was established in March 1915 and in use until November 1917. All 420 casualties in this cemetery were buried during this period, including Private George Montague Price whose grave could not be identified at the time. Only seven casualties remain unidentified.



Private George Montague Price 1878 – 1916

George Montague Price was born in Herefordshire in 1878. He was the fourth and youngest child of Andrew Price, a builder, and his wife Alice. Prior to the war George was a stonemason, though he joined the army in May 1916. He arrived in France in August 1916, and was killed in action near Hill 60 in Belgium in early October 1917.

At the time he was killed, George Price was buried in a field grave. However, by the time he was recovered in the autumn of 1920 and moved to Chester Farm – anything recording his name had been lost and he was buried as an unknown soldier of the 5th Bn South Wales Borderers.

Research has now revealed the final resting place of George Montague Price, and today we restore his name to him.
