Second Lieutenant Ernest Lockett Cole



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Second Lieutenant Ernest Lockett Cole was born in 1887 in Barrow-in-Furness, Cumbria. He was one of six children born to James Henry Cole and his wife Ada. He worked as a clerk before the war. In 1915 he married Mary Constance Gardner. Their son, also named Ernest Lockett Cole, was born on 19 March 1917, nearly six months after his death.

Ernest joined 5th Battalion The King's Liverpool Regiment in 1905 and in 1905 transferred to 4th Battalion The King's Own Royal Lancaster Regiment. He reached the rank of serjeant, but left in 1913. On 16 November 1915 Ernest was Commissioned into The Northamptonshire Regiment and pioned 8th Battalion.

Having been attached to 1st Battalion, Second Lieutenant Cole arrived on the Western Front on 6 September 1916, A few weeks later on 27 September 1916, C Company of 1st Battalion The Northamptonshire Regiment took part in an attack on the Flers Line in support of 2st Battalion The King's Royal Rifle Corps. The attack was unsuccessful and Second Lieutenant Cole was killed during the flohting.

After the war the remainise of Second Leutenant Cole were moved into Ovillera Military Cemetery. He was buried as an unknown Second Leutenant of The Northamptonshire Regiment. It was clothed that the inliable EC were marked on this man's clothing. As he was missing, Second Leutenant Cole cole was commenciated on the Theyaryal Memorital. The Commonwealth War Graves Commission's Ovillers Military Cemetery was created as a battle cemetery behind a dressing station and was in use until March 1917. The cemetery was greatly increased after the Armistice by the concentration of graves from the battlefields of Pozieres, Ovillers, La Boisselle and Contalmaison. It is from this area

that Second Lieutenant Ernest Lockett Cole, unidentified at the time, was brought in for burial.

Second Lieutenant Ernest Lockett Cole est né à Barrow-in-Furness, en Cumbria, en 1887. Il été un des six enfants nés à James Henry Cole et sa femme Ada. En 1915, il a épousé Mary Constance Gardner, Leur fils, Ernest Lockett Cole, est né le 19 mars, 1917, presque six mois après la mort de Second Lieutenant Col.

En 1905, Ernest s'est joint au 5º Bataillon du King's Liverpool Regiment et n 1909, il a transféré au 4º Bataillon du King's Own Royal Lancaster Regiment. Il a parti en 1913, Le 16 novembre, 1915, Ernest a obtenu une commission comme Second Lieutenant au Northamptonshire Regiment et s'est joint le 8º Bataillon. Après avoir été adjoint au 1º Bataillon, il est arrivés sur le Front Occidental le 6 sentembre 1916.

Trois semaines plus tard, le 27 septembre, 1916, C Company du 1º Batalilon du Northamptonshire Regiment a participé à une attaque sur le Fiers Lind'e en soutien 2º Batalillon du King's Royal Rifle Corps. L'attaque n'est pas une réussite et Second Leutenant Cole a dété ué au cours des combats ce jour-là.

Après la guerre ses restes ont été enterré à Ovillers Military Cemetery comme un Second Lieutenant inconnu du Northamptonshire Regiment. Il a été observé que les initiales 'EC' ont été marquées sur ses vétements.

Le nom de Second Lieutenant Cole est ainsi commémoré sur le monument commémoratif des disparus à Thiepval. Cependant, la nouvelle recherche a permis le sité de son dernier repos d'être identifié. Aujourd'hui nous nous souviendrons de Second Lieitenant Cole et sa tombe sera consacrée une nouvelle fois.
