

# **Lieutenant Charles Stonehouse**



Lieutenant Charles Stonehouse was born in Blackburn on 15 May 1882. He was the son of Francis and Mary Ann Stonehouse and was an architect by profession. He enlisted as a Private in the 11<sup>th</sup> Battalion, The East Lancashire Regiment on 17 September 1914, shortly after the outbreak of the First World War. Having been promoted to Lance Corporal, he was given a battlefield commission on 18 January 1915 and was promoted to the rank of Lieutenant on 20 June that year.

On 1 July 1916, the first day of the Battle of the Somme, Lieutenant Stonehouse led W Company into the battalion's attack on Serre. He was killed in the course of the attack. For just over a hundred years his final resting place remained unknown and he is commemorated on the Thiepval Memorial. However, new research has shown that he is in fact buried in this cemetery. During this service we will remember Lieutenant Stonehouse and his grave will be rededicated.

Lieutenant Charles Stonehouse est né le 15 mai 1882 à Blackburn. Il était le fils de Francis et Mary Ann Stonehouse et il fut un architecte de profession. Le 17 septembre, 1914 un peu après le début de la Première Guerre Mondiale, il s'enrôle comme Private dans le 11<sup>e</sup> Batallion, The East Lancashire Regiment. Ayant été promu Lance Corporal, il est devenu un officier commissionné le 18 janvier 1915 et il fut Lieutenant le 20 juin cette année-là.

Le 1 juillet 1916, le premier jour de La bataille de la Somme, Lieutenant Stonehouse a dirigé W Company durant de leur attaque sur Serre. Il fut tué au cours de cette attaque. Pendant un peu plus de cent ans le site de son dernier repos restait inconnu et son nom est ainsi commémoré sur le Monument Commémoratif à Thiepval. Cependant on sait maintenant qu'il est en fait enterré dans ce cimetière. Au cours de ce service nous nous souviendrons de Lieutenant Stonehouse et sa tombe sera consacrée une nouvelle fois.

## Serre Road Cemetery No. 3

In June 1916 the 'Serre Road' leading out of Mailly-Maillet was in British hands, and entered No Man's Land about 1,170 metres South-West of the village of Serre, which was held by the Germans. The East Lancashire Regiment attacked the village on 1 July 1916, and although some men reached Serre, the attack failed. The 3rd and 31st Divisions renewed the attempt. without success, on 13 November. Serre was finally captured on 25 February 1917 after the Germans evacuated the village. In the spring of 1917, graves from the battlefields of the Ancre. including that of Lt Stonehouse, were brought into a number of small cemeteries. Over 80 casualties who fell in July and November 1916 are now commemorated at the Commonwealth War Graves Commission's Serre Road No 3 Cemetery. Of these, over half remain unidentified and special memorials are erected to four men who are known or believed to be buried among them.
