# Lance Corporal Frederick Thomas Perkins



Lance Corporal Frederick Thomas Perkins was born in Great Waltham, Essex, in 1891. He was the eldest of the seven children born to James Richard Perkins and Elizabeth Anne Poulter. He worked for the TD Ridley and Sons Ltd Hartford End Brewery. On 27 September 1913 Frederick married Florence Annie Barker at the Church of St John the Evangelist in Ford End. Their son, Philip Jethro Perkins, was born the following year. Frederick joined 4<sup>th</sup> Battalion The Essex Regiment and is thought to have transferred to 11<sup>th</sup> Battalion in September 1916 when he left for the Western Front.

The War Diaries of 11<sup>th</sup> Battalion The Essex Regiment show that on 22 April 1917, they took part in an attack north of Lens. The assaulting companies left the front line in Novel Alley, assaulting on a front of 350 yards. C Company who were in reserve, moved up into Novel Alley as B and D Companies moved off and A Company remained in reserve.

B Company reached their objective but encountered opposition. D Company also reached their objective and attacked along Nash Alley. Severe fighting followed and when their supply of bombs had run out they were forced to retire. A platoon from C Company and 3 platoons of A Company were brought into action. At 16:00 hrs a heavy enemy bombardment of the area commenced causing severe casualties, around 10 officers and 250 other ranks. It was during this action that Lance Corporal Perkins went missing.

In January 2018 the remains of a soldier of The Essex Regiment were found during ordnance clearance work at the site of a new hospital to the north of Lens. Research was carried out by the Joint Casualty and Compassionate Centre and The Essex Regiment Museum to establish the identity of this soldier. The location of the find pointed to this solider having served with 11<sup>th</sup> Battalion The Essex Regiment and having been killed on 22 April or between 24 June and 9 July 1917.

The soldier was found with a spoon engraved '4 Ex' and '3899' and a fragment of a note pad marked '389', indicating that they had previously been a member of 4<sup>th</sup> Battalion The Essex Regiment and served under that regimental number. After much searching through records, the Will of Lance Corporal Perkins was discovered. It was this document which confirmed the spoon had belonged to him. DNA testing was then carried out which confirmed that this soldier was indeed Lance Corporal Perkins.

More than 100 years after his death, we will today remember Lance Corporal Frederick Thomas Perkins and he will be laid to rest in the presence of his family.

The Commonwealth War Grave Commission's Loos British Cemetery was begun by the Canadian Corps in July 1917 for casualties from the Battle for Hill 70. The remainder of the cemetery was formed after the Armistice by the concentration of graves from smaller cemeteries and the surrounding battlefields. Sadly, almost two thirds of those buried here remain unidentified. Lance Corporal Frederick Thomas Perkins was recovered nearby and will now be laid to rest alongside other men from his regiment. Lance Corporal Frederick Thomas Perkins est né en 1891 à Great Waltham, Essex. Il été le plus aine des sept enfants de James Richard Perkins et Elizabeth Anne Poulter. Il travaillait dans la brasserie de TD Ridley and Sons Ltd à Hartford End. Le 27 septembre 1913 Frederick a épousé Florence Annie Barker à l'église de St John l'Evangéliste a Ford End. Leur fils, Philip Jethro Perkins, est né l'année suivante. Frederick est devenu un membre de 4<sup>e</sup> Bataillon, The Essex Regiment et il est estimé qu'il a transféré à 11<sup>e</sup> Bataillon en septembre 1916 avant son départ pour le front occidental.

Les Journaux de Guerre de 11e Bataillon, The Essex Regiment indiquent que le 22 avril 1917, ils ont pris part à une attaque au nord de Lens. Les troupes attaquantes ont quitté la première ligne à Novel Alley. Le Company C qui été en réserve, ont déplacés dans Novel Alley après que le Companys B et D ont commencé l'attaque, le Company A été en réserve.

Le Company B a s'atteint ses objectifs mais il a rencontré l'opposition. Le Company D a s'atteint ses objectives aussi et ils ont attaqués le long de Nash Alley. Des combats violents ont suivi et quand qu'ils n'y avaient plus de grenades, ils étaient forcés de prendre leur retraite. Un peloton de Company C et trois pelotons de Company A ont étaient mise en action. A 16:00 heures un lourd bombardement ennemi a commencé dans la région, causant plusieurs victimes, environ 10 Officiers et 250 des rangs subalternes. C'était au cours de cette attaque que Lance Corporal Perkins est disparu.

En janvier 2018 les restes d'un soldat du Essex Regiment ont été trouvés au cours des opérations d'enlèvement de munitions au site d'un nouveau l'hôpital à Lens. Des recherches ont été menées par le Joint Casualty and Compassionante Centre et le musée du Essex Regiment pour tentir établir l'identité de ce soldat. La localisation où les restes ont été trouvés indiqué que ce soldat été un membre de 11e Bataillon, The Essex Regiment et qu'il est mort le 22 avril ou entre le 24 juin et 9 juillet 1917. Ce soldat a été trouvé avec une cuillère gravé '4 Ex' et '3899' et un fragment d'un carnet estampillé '389' qui indiquent que ce soldat avait servi auparavant avec 4e Bataillon, the Essex Regiment avec ce matricule régimentaire. Après avoir fait des recherches dans des archives, le testament du Lance Corporal Perkins a été découvert. C'était ce document-là qui a confirmé que la cuillère lui ayant appartenu. Un test ADN a été effectuée qui ont confirmé que ce soldat est en fait Lance Corporal Perkins.

Plus de 100 ans après son décès, aujourd'hui nous nous souviendrons de Lance Corporal Frederick Thomas Perkins et il sera inhumé en présence de sa famille.
