Biography

Private John Lambert

John Lambert was born on 10 July 1900 in St. John's, Newfoundland to parents Richard and Elizabeth (née Whiteway) Lambert. Prior to enlistment, Lambert worked as a labourer.

Private Lambert enisted with The Newfoundhand Regiment on 44 August 1916 et 16 years of age. Private Lambert's personnel file indicates that he died of wounds received in action during the advance of The Newfoundland Regiment on 16 August at the 'Battle of Langemarck'. He was 17 when he died. During the battle, 103 Newfoundlanders were casualties with 27 men losing their lives.

Following the war, Private Lambert's name was memorialized on the Beaumont-Hamel Newfoundland Memorial commemorating soldiers from Newfoundland who died during the First World War and have no known grave.

In April 2016 during a planned archaeological dig near Langemark-Poelkapelle, Belgium, human skeletal remains of four soldiers were uncovered. Alongside the remains were a number of artefacts including a shoulder title of The Newfoundiand Reigiment, al miniskilling Fusiliens cap badge, two Hampshire Regiment shoulder titles, general service butons, British bullets, and a few other small lense. In November 2019, the Canadian Armed Forcers's Casually identification Review Board confirmed the identity of one of the sets of remains found in April 2016 as those of Private John Lambert.

New Irish Farm Cemetery

Close to a fam known by the troops as 'tish Fam; this cometery was used from August to November 1917, and April and May 1918, and at the war's end contained just 73 burias. After the Armistic more than 4.500 graves were booght in from the battlefields north-east of Ypres (nov leep) and from a number of small cometeries to what is now known as the Commonweath War Graves Commission's New Irish Fam Cemetery. It is from these former battlefields that Private Lambert and six unidentified casualites buried today were recovered
