

A Rededication Service for Lance Corporal Leonard Thomas Courtney

Lance Corporal Leonard Thomas Courtney

Lance Corporal Leonard Thomas Courtney was born in 1895 in Barnstable, Devon. He was the eldest of the six children of Thomas Courtney and Caroline Amelia Easterbrook. Before joining the Army he worked as a designer for Brannam Pottery. Initially assigned to 1/7th Battalion The Worcestershire Regiment he later transferred to 4th Battalion. He was 23 when he was killed in action on 20 October 1918, just three weeks before the end of the First World War.

On 19 October 1918 the 88th Brigade advanced across the Lys Canal before on 20 October, attacking to the north. 4th Battalion The Worcestershire Regiment were in reserve. The Battalion were tasked with mopping up the southern area of Harelbeke before moving to Stasegem to help clear the village. Lance Corporal Leonard Thomas Courtney was killed during the course of this action. For nearly a hundred years his final resting place has remained unknown and he is commemorated on the Tyne Cot Memorial. However, he is now known to be buried in this cemetery. Today we will remember Lance Corporal Courtney and his grave will be rededicated.

23 casualties from several different Regiments who died in the vicinity of Stasegem during October and November 1918 were buried in the Stasegem Communal Cemetery by the 29th Division Burial Officers. Although they were able to name twenty of them, three remained unidentified.

Call to Worship

We have come to this place to rededicate the final resting place of Lance Corporal Leonard Thomas Courtney who served with The Worcestershire Regiment, whose life was taken during the Great War, and whose remains were reinterred here.

Today, in this place, we accord this man the dignity and respect that he is due and commend him to the mercy and grace of God our redeemer and judge, and in the hope and life given to us by our Lord Jesus Christ who died for us.

May the peace of the Lord be always with you, All and also with you.


The Lord's Prayer
