

A Burial Service for

Unknown Commonwealth Soldiers of the Great War

14:30 hours Tuesday 29 April 2025 CWGC Ovillers Military Cemetery

Service conducted by Reverend Joseph Roberts CF Chaplain to 4 Regiment Royal Logistics Corps



Background

In May 2022 the digging of a drainage trench near Fricourt uncovered the remains of a casualty of the First World War. Sadly no artefacts were recovered with the remains to indicate the nationality or regimental affiliation of the man, and without this it has been impossible to identify him. Other recoveries from the same location suggest that he was most likely a casualty of the Battle of the Somme.

In April 2024 a further set of remains were discovered by a fieldwalker looking over a freshly ploughed field near Fricourt. Further investigation of the site revealed no distinguishing artefacts which would help to identify the man, nor anything which could even tell us nationality – though general service buttons found near his remains tell us he did serve with one of the Commonwealth nations. Additionally, remains from another two individuals were also found during the investigation. The location at which the remains were found saw action both during the opening days of the Battle of the Somme in 1916, and during the Second Battle of Bapaume in 1918.

Today we give thanks for the sacrifice of these men, and all those who died alongside them.

Cemetery

The Commonwealth War Graves Commission's Ovillers Military Cemetery was created as a battlefield cemetery behind a dressing station. The cemetery was increased after the Armistice by the concentration of graves from the battlefields of Pozieres, Ovillers, La Boisselle and Contalmaison. It is from this area that these unknown casualties were discovered and can now be laid to rest alongside their comrades.
