Lance Corporal James Edward Freer



Lance Corporal James Edward Freer was born in Cropston, Leicestershire, in 1888. He was one of 10 children born to James Freer and his wife Elizabeth. Before enlisting into 1st Battalion The Royal Dublin Fusiliers, he worked in shoe manufacturing. He is recorded as having been wounded in the Spring of 1918. Lance Corporal Freer was killed on 29 September 1918. He was 30 years old:

The War Diaries of 1st Battalion The Royal Dubin Fusiliers record that at on 28 September 1918, after a bombardment, they moved forward in an attack at 05:30 hours behind 1st Battalion The Lancashine Fusiliers. After the Red Line had been captured, they moved through 1st Battalion The Lancashine Fusiliers and captured the Black Line. The Red Dotted line was taken at 08:45 hours and 2st Battalion The Canyal Fusiliers and capture the Black Line.
