

A Rededication Service for

Serjeant John Harold Bott DCM 11th Battalion The Royal Fusiliers (City of London Regiment)

14:15 hours on Wednesday 20 March 2024 CWGC Hooge Crater Cemetery, Belgium

Service conducted by The Reverend Tom Sander CF Chaptain to The Household Cavalry



Serieant John Harold Bott DCM was born in Longton. Staffordshire, in 1896. He was one of four brothers born to Ethel, was born later to his mother and stepfather. The 1911 Census records that he was working as a hainfreeser's apprentice.

John enlisted into the Army in September 1914, shortly after the outbreak of the First World War, and was posted to 11th Battalion The Royal Fusiliers (City of London Regiment). He arrived on the Western Front on 26 July 1915. In the summer of 1916, he fought and was wounded on the Somme. He was awarded the Distinguished Conduct Medal for his actions there. The medal citation, which was published in the London Gazette of 25 November 1916, stated that it was awarded 'For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led a bombing party with great courage and determination, capturing an enemy machine gun and killing the team."

In the spring of 1917, the battalion fought in the Battle of Arras before moving to Flanders. On 31 July 1917, the first day of the Third Battle of Ypres, 11th Battalion The Royal went into action again. The battalion War Diaries show that on 10 August 1917. they took part in an attack on the Westhoek Ridge with the aim of taking Inverness Copse, Glencorse Wood and the southern end of the ridge. The two attacking companies proceeded behind a barrage at 04:35 hours and they and the support company reached the Jargon Support Line north of

Having come under machine gun fire, the advance halted and their position remained the same until around 06:00 hours, by which stage most of the Officers and Non-Commissioned Officers, including Serieant Bott, aged 21, had become casualties. The enemy counterattacked from Inverness Copse

with machine oun fire and bombing parties who moved up the trenches in their southern flank and took the right company in

the rear. The uncovered flank of the battalion was rolled up and cushed back to a strong point on the crest of the ridge. The position was consolidated and held until they were relieved

After the war Serieant Bott's body was recovered and he was buried as an unknown soldier of The Royal Fusiliers in Hooge Crater Cemetery. It was noted that the soldier had received the Distinguished Conduct Medal. As he was missing. Serieant Bott was commemorated on the Menin Gate However, new research has shown that this is in fact the grave of Serieant Bott and the headstone has now been changed. Today we will remember Serieant Bott and his grave will be rededicated.

Hooge Chateau was located on the frontine for much of the First World War and was the scene of very fierce fighting throughout the conflict. The Commonwealth War Graves Commission's Hooge Crater Cemetery was established in early October 1917, but was greatly increased after the Armistice when graves were brought in from smaller cemeteries and the surrounding battlefields of Ziliebeke. Commonwealth servicemen commemorated in this cemetery remain unidentified
