Serjeant William Augustus Fritz

Serjeant William Augustus Fritz was born in London in 1880. He was one of eight children born to Daniel Fritz and his wife Maria. His grandfather, John Fritz, was born in Germany. On 2 December 1906, William married Emily Ann Chrichley in Islington. Their daughter, Alice, was born in 1912. Before enlisting William worked as a dairyman.

At the outbreak of the First World War, 4th Battalion The Royal Fusiliers was immediately mobilised for the Western Front and landed at Le Havre on 13 August 1914. On the morning of 23 August 1914 the battalion was located north of Mons holding outposts along the canal at Nimy. The Germans attacked with at least four battalions of infantry as well as cavalry and artillery. 4th Battalion The Royal Fusiliers suffered heavy casualties at the bridges over the canal from rifle and artillery fire. Practically all the machine gun detachment under Lieutenant Maurice James Dease VC, was killed or wounded. Lieutenant Dease was wounded multiple times and was eventually killed. He was posthumously awarded the Victoria Cross for his actions that day. The machine guns were disabled by artillery fire and had to be destroyed and abandoned.

At 13:10 hours the first order to retire was given. The final order to retire was received at 13:40 hours. Famously, Private Sidney Frank Godley VC offered to stay behind and single handedly defended the railway bridge at Nimy while the rest of the section retreated. He was wounded twice and eventually taken prisoner. Private Godley was also awarded the Victoria Cross for his actions that day. The battalion reported casualties of around three Officers and a hundred and fifty men. Serjeant Fritz was one of the men killed during the fighting that day. He was 34 years old.

The remains of many of those killed at Nimy were recovered by the Germans and buried in St Symphorien Military Cemetery. Serjeant Fritz is now known to have been amongst those buried there although he was not identifiable at the time. As he was missing, Serjeant Fritz was commemorated on the La Ferté-sous-Jouarre Memorial. However, new research has shown that this is the grave of Serjeant Fritz and the headstone over his grave has been changed to reflect this. Today we will remember Serjeant William Augustus Fritz and his grave will be rededicated.

The Commonwealth War Graves Commission's St Symphorien Military Cemetery was established by the German Army following the Battle of Mons in August 1914 as a final resting place for British and German soldiers. Privates John Parr and George Lawrence Price are buried in the cemetery, who are thought to be the first and last Commonwealth soldiers killed in action during the First World War. Among those killed during the Battle of Mons and buried here by the Germans was Serjeant William Augustus Fritz.

Serjeant William Augustus Fritz est né à Londres en 1880. Il était l'un des huit enfants nés à Daniel Fritz et de sa femme Maria. Son grand-père, John Fritz, était né en Allemagne. Le 2 décembre 1906, William a épousé Emily Ann Chrichley à Islington. Leur fille, Alice, était née en 1912. Avant de s'engager, William travaillait comme laitier.

Au début de la Première Guerre mondiale, le 4° Bataillon du Royal Fusiliers a été immédiatement mobilisé pour le front occidental et a débarqué au Le Havre le 13 août 1914. Le matin du 23 août 1914, le bataillon se trouvait au nord de Mons et tenait des avant-postes le long du canal à Nimy. Les Allemands ont attaqué avec au moins de quatre bataillons d'infanterie ainsi que de la cavalerie et de l'artillerie. Le 4° Bataillon du Royal Fusiliers a subi de lourdes pertes aux ponts

sur le canal sous les tirs de fusils et d'artillerie. Pratiquement tout le détachement de mitrailleurs sous le commandement du Lieutenant Maurice James Dease VC fut tué ou blessé. Lieutenant Dease fut blessé à plusieurs reprises et finit par être tué. Il a reçu la Victoria Cross pour ses actions ce jour-là. Les mitrailleuses furent mises hors de service par les tirs d'artillerie et durent être détruites et abandonnées.

À 13:00 heures, le premier ordre de retraite était donné. L'ordre final de retraite était reçu à 13:40 heures. Private Sidney Frank Godley VC est célèbre pour avoir proposé de rester sur place et défendu à lui seul le pont ferroviaire de Nimy pendant que le reste de la section battait en retraite. Il fut blessé à deux reprises et finit par être fait prisonnier. Private Godley reçut également la Victoria Cross pour ses actions ce jour-là. Le bataillon a signalé environ trois officiers et cent cinquante hommes parmi les victimes. Serjeant Fritz était l'un des hommes tués au cours des combats ce jour-là. Il avait 34 ans.

Les restes de nombreuses victimes tuées à Nimy ont été récupérés par les Allemands et enterrés au St Symphorien Military Cemetery. On sait aujourd'hui que Serjeant Fritz fait partie des personnes enterrées là-bas, même s'il n'a pas pu être identifié à l'époque. Comme il était porté disparu, Serjeant Fritz a été commémoré au monument commémoratif des disparus à La Ferté-sous-Jouarre. Cependant, la nouvelle recherche a permis le site de son dernier repos d'être identifié. Aujourd'hui nous nous souviendrons de Serjeant William Augustus Fritz et sa tombe sera consacrée une nouvelle fois.

May this act of rededication renew in us a spirit of gratitude, humility, and peace, as we remember Serjeant Fritz and all who gave their lives in the service of others.

May the Peace of the Lord be always with you, All and also with you.
