# Private Charles Ernest Lane

Private Charles Ernest Lane was born on 18 June 1890 in Aston, Warvickshire. He was the youngest of two children born to William Lane and his wife Annie. Before enlisting into the Army, he worked as a clerk in a rubber works. On 6 April 1913, Charles married Agnes Coates in Aston. Their daughter, Marie, was born on 25 November 1916.

Charles enlisted on 9 December 1915 and was mobilised on 12 April 1916. He served with both The Worcestershife Regiment and 17" Battalion The Hampshire Regiment in the United Kingdom. On 30 April 1918, he was transferred to 1<sup>st</sup> Garrison Battalion The Hampshire Regiment and embarked for the Western Front. On 10 May 1918, he was transferred again to 14<sup>st</sup> Battalion The Yark and Lancaster Regiment.

On the moving of 2 November 1918, 14<sup>49</sup> Battaion The York and Lancaster Reginnet were in the line near Autory, Patola were sent out at 05:00 hours and 10:00 hours. At 15:00 hours A and D Companies, who were holding posts established the day before, were ordered to advance and establish new posts. A heavy barrage operand up on them as they were about to advance and they encounteed heavy machine gun fere from Jonar. They suffered causalises of one Offerer and nine other ranks kilded. Pirvate Lane, aged 28, was among those who died.

In 1920, this remains of Private Lane and 34 other men were concentrated into Albuerchicout British Cemetery, from Auhrop British 1947 Bay, how was builded as an unknown died on 2 November 1918. As he was missing, Private Lane was commemorated on the Vis-en-Arctis Memorial to the missing, However, new reaserch has shown that this is in fact the grave of Private Lane and he headstone over the grave and his grave will be redecidated. Made in October 1918, the Commonwealth War Graves Commission's Auberchicourt British Cemetery is the final resting place of 300 Commonwealth service personnel. It was enlarged after the Armistice when graves were brought in from smaller burial grounds and the surrounding battlefields. These included the grave of Private Charles Ernest Lane, who could not be identified at the time.

Private Charles Ernest Lane est né à Aston, Warwickshire, le 3 juin, 1890. I est le plus jeune des deux enfants de William Lane et sa femme Annie. Avant de s'engager dans farmée, it a travaillé comme employé dans une usine de caoutchouc. Le 6 avril, 1913. Charles épouse Agnes Coates à Aston. Leur fille, Marie. est née le 25 novembre. 1918.

Charles s'est engagé le 9 décembre, 1915 et a été mobilisé le 12 avril, 1916. Il a servi dans le Worcestershire Regiment et dans le 17<sup>e</sup> Batallion du Hampshire Regiment au Royaume-Uni. Le 30 avril, 1918, il a été transféré au 1° Garrison Batallon du Hampshire Regiment et a embarqué pour le front occidental. Le 10 mai, 1918, il est à nouveau transféré au 1/4<sup>e</sup> Batallon du Vork and Lancaster Regiment.

Le matin du 2 novembre 1918, 14º Batalilich du York and Lenaster Regiment data en ligne prés d'Auinoy. Des patroulles sont envoytes à 65:00 heures et à 10:00 heures A 5:00 heures, les compagnies A 40. qui taniant des postes dabbils la veille, requent l'ordre d'avance et d'établides nouveaux postes.
