Private Peter Keill 7th Battalion The Seaforth Highlanders

14:30 hours 25 October 2023 CWGC Dadizeele New British Cemetery Belgium

Service conducted by the Reverend David Jeal CF Chaplain to 2nd Battalion The Royal Regiment of Scotland

Private Peter Keill



Private Peter Keill was born on 20 May 1898 in Gorvan, Glasgow, Scotland. He was one of ten children born to Robert Keill and his wife Mary. Peter enlisted into The Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders. He later transferred to 5th Battalion The Seaforth Highlanders before transferring to 7th Battalion.

By October 1916 the static fighting associated with the Western Front, which had kept the Brish Army in Belgium within the Ypres Salient since 1914, had littled, and Allied frores were advanced, By 660 Obcuss on 1 October 1918, 7th Batalian The Seatorth Hightanders were in assembly positions in front of the vilage of Skypacappells. Alter a brief barrage, they statusced at 00: 15 hours and were successful in reaching Ledgeham. After a pause they continued the attack. but now met stiffer resistance. They captured the village of Ledgeham and paushed out portion is in the direction of Rolephemospelie.

2th Battaino The Seaforth Highlanders encountered hostie machine gurfles and as the battainos operating on their flanks had not made the same progress, they fell back to the raikwy line and consolidated their positions. The battainot had suffered casualities of 23 killed in action or died of wounds, 4 missing and 73 wounded. The village of Dadizeele, behind German lines for most of the war, was captured by British forces in late September 1918. It wasn't until after the Armistice that the Commonwealth War Graves Commission's Dadizeele New British Centerlet was established. The graves, including that of Private Peter Kell, were brought in from the surrounding burial grounds and battlefields. There are now over 1000 Commonwealth burials of the First Word War in this cometerv.
