History

The Boulton Paul Defiant was a single engine, two-seater turner fighter aircraft. Defiant L6598 was piloted by Pilot Officer Thomas and the rear gunner was LAC Bromley. Bromley was confirmed killed in action by Thomas who managed to escape by paractive and evade capture, assumed that the aircraft came down into one of the waterways and was lost without a trace".

Thomas gave a statement that said "The operation took place in the dawning hours of 13 May 1940...unfortunately we were intercepted by a large number of enemy fighters and a severe air battle took place in which our aircraft were considerably outnumbered. John Stuart Bromley acquitted himself very well, accounting for two enemy aircraft and possibly a third. However, there was a very sudden burst of fire: all controls were shot out of my hands and the aircraft caught fire. I called to Bromley on the radio telephone several times and told him to bale out, but there was no reply. Finally, I waggled the wings of the aircraft from side to side, this being a pre-arranged signal to bale out if the radio failed". His mother, Constance. was so distraught over her son's death that it was suggested a Welfare Officer delivered the news relayed by Thomas in the post-war period, as a standard letter could be "more than she could bear".

John Stuart Mee Bromley was born on 17 March 1916 in Toxteth Park, Liverpool. His mother was Constance Maud Bromley who never married or had any further children. He was baptised on 15 June 1916 in Liverpool and died on 13 May 1940.

Nijmogen was a frontline town from 17 September 1944 until February 1945. An initial temporary burial ground was created by No. 3 Casualty Clearing station in a wooded area known as Jonkers Bosch, from which it took its name. The Commonwealth War Graves Commission Jonkerbos War Cometery was established nearby after the war and contains over 1,640 graves. Leading Arcraftman Bromley is being laid to rest in the cemetery having previously been commemorated or VMCS as Forces Memorial at Rummymede.
