#### Lance Corporal Brunton Smith

Brunton Smith was born on 13 July 1882 and worked as a gunpowder maker and coalminer in the colliery near his home in Roslin, Midlothian.

His family believe that when he was in his late 20's, he boarded a ship to New Zealand in anticipation of finding a marrying in Scotland. Brunton was a member of the independent Order of Rechabites and was an avowed abstainer of alcohol.

On 31 December 1913, Brunton married Helen Webster Anderson at the Original Hotel in Roslin, Midiothian. He had two daughters, Helen Anderson, born in August 1914 and Jane Lawrie, born in December 1915. Brunton's emigration plans were put on hold when he joined the 8th Battalion Royal Scots in 1915. He was killed in action on 24 March 1918.
