Lance Corporal George Rankeillor

17 January 1897 - 11 April 1917

George Rankeillor was born in Edinburgh in 1897 to George senior, a rubber worker, and his wide Julia McDonald. He was the secondeldest of 10 children.

Unfortunately very little survives to tell us about his young life, but we know that he attested to the 5th Reserve Regiment of Cavalry, York in late 1914 or early 1915. He was then posted to the 1st (Royal) Dragoons and arrived in France with them on the 5th October 1915. He was promoted to an unpaid Lance Corporal in October 1916.

By 1917 George had been confirmed in the role of Lance Corporal, and had received the award of salary commensurate with that rank. At the beginning of April he was with his unit on the outskirts of Arras. It was bitterly cold, snowing and the war diary records blizzard conditions. During this time, the area came under very heavy shell fire, the Royal Dragoons were relatively lightly affected losing 68 horses and just a few men. George was one of the those killed. Regimental records show that George was buried in the field and his grave was marked with a wooden cross

In October 1919 two casualties of the 1st (Royal) Dragoons were recovered from unmarked field graves just north of Feuchy Chapel. One was identified as Private J. Jordan who had died on 11 April 1917 whilst the other could only be identified as a member of the Royal Dragoons.

Recently, all the records were drawn together for the first time and interrogated as one. This has shown that Private Jordan and the unknown soldier were buried in the same field grave, and therefore most likely died together. With George bring the only man of the Royal Dragoons missing from this area on this day, it has finally been possible to prove that the grave of the unknown soldier is in fact that of Lance Corporal George Rankeillor of the 1st (Royal) Dragoons.

The Cemetery

CWGC Feuchy Chapel British Cemetery contains the graves and commemorations of 1,103 Commonwealth casualties of the First World War. The original cemetery, Plot I, was begun by the VI Corps Burial Officer in May 1917 and used at intervals until March 1918, and again in August and September 1918. Following the Armistice, a further 834 graves were brought in from the battlefields of Fampoux, Roeux, Monchy and Wancourt. This included the previously unidentified grave of Lance Corporal George Rankeillor.
