The Blessing and Dedication of The New Ypres League Standard and Memorial Plaque

October 15th 2024 St George's Memorial Church, Ypres

Remember to Help us Remember Them.

Introducing the New Ypres League.

You may be familiar with the original Ypres League, the First World War remembrance society which was founded in 1920 and which grew rapidly to be the first remembrance organisation of its kind in Ypres. Totaling around 35,000 members, the Ypres League published a journal, the Ypres Times, as well as guidebooks and maps to the Ypres Salient. Besides acting as a brotherhood for those who fought there, the Ypres League wanted to perpetuate the historical and symbolical significance of Ypres to the British Empire and believed it their sacred duty to maintain the memory of those who fought and fell in its defence.

Remembrance in the Ypres Salient of today presents us with a whole news of or unique challenges. The last veterans of the Great War left us a few years ago but remembering the fallen in the Salient is still as relevant today as it was in the 1920s and 30s. The remains of Veror 153,000 missing addiers lay in the cold day of Flanders, and although the Great War ended over 100 years ago, the Salient still regularity gives up its terrble harvest. Once the recovered remains have gone through the identification process, they are rebuiled with full honours in one of the many military cemeteries in the area.

These ceremonies and the sacrifice made by these soldiers require official recognition in the form of wreath laying and the attendance of a standard bearer. In addition to the burials there are many other ceremonies which require official attendance. However, as time

marches on, there are fewer and fewer people and organisations available to perform these tasks.

Therefore, more than 80 years after the demise of Its predecessor, it has been decided to found a New Ypres League. The founding members are British and Beigian residents of Ypres supported by regular British visitors to the city, all with a track record of promoting interest in the First World War and preserving the memory of the fallen in the Ypres Sailent. The New Ypres League is a registered Y2W, a not-for-profit association according to Belgian Law, with Luitenant-Kolonel isabelic Laway. Mittair Commandart van de Provincie West - Vlaanderen graciously agreeing to become Patro in Chief of the organisation. The aims of the New Ypres League are based on the core values of the original Ypres League:

- To continue our commitment and obligation to the fallen by commemorating all soldiers who lost their lives in the Ypres Salient during the Great War, by attending burial, rededication and memorial services.
- To restore the historic relationship between the Ypres League and St George's Memorial Church in Ypres.
- To reinstate Ypres Day, October 31st, as a commemoration day in the city of Ypres.
- To monitor the condition and status of the Demarcation Stones funded by the Ypres League in the 1920s, and consider funding any restoration needed.
- To foster good relations between the people of Ypres and visitors from the Commonwealth.
- To build relationships with the city of Ypres, its surrounding towns and all our fellow remembrance organisations in the area.
