

## Introduction

The Battle of Fromelles was a combined attack by British and Australian troops on 19-20 July 1916, in France, during the First World War. The aim of the operation was to seize the Germanheld salient just north of the village of Fromelles.

It was the first offensive operation by the Australian Imperial Froce on the Western Front and was intended to divert German troops away from the spic Battle of the Sensus. The high casualties from Australia's 5th Division, fighting alongside the British 61st Division, remind us that the battle remains the worst loss of life in a 24 hour period in Australia's history.

The remains of 250 Allied soldiers recovered from mass graves in 2009 were reintered in the Fromelles (Pheasant Wood) Military Cemetery, with full military homours, in 2010, A ceremony to dedicate the new cemetery occurred on 19 July 2010, the anniversary of the Battle of Fromelles, during which the soldiers from Pheasant Wood gave their lives.

During the period of 2010 to 2014 Joint Australian and British Identification Boards confirmed the identities of 144 Australian soldiers by name.

From 2015 to 2019 Australian Army Fromelles Identification Boards identified a further 22 Australian soldiers by name.

In late 2022 and early 2023 Australian identification boards identified a further seven soldiers, whose new headstones we unveil here today, as we commemorate the 107th anniversary of the battle.

To date 173 Australian soldiers who were killed during the Battle of Fromelles and buried here at Fromelles (Pheasant Wood) Military Cemetery have now been identified, while efforts to identify the remaining 77 soldiers continue.
