Second Leiutenant Wilfred John Massey Lynch



Second Lieutenant Wilfred John Massey Lynch was born in West Derby, a suburb of Lieuproli. in 1833. He was one of five sons born to Thomas Massey Lynch and his wife Lisle. He was educated at Stoneyhurst College in Lancashine, then worked with the Bank of Liverpool for two years. He left to train as a farmer at Ross-or-Wye in Herefordshire, where he met and married Gwendoline Harris in 1914. They moved to south east Australia to set up a first farm. Their daughter, Lisle, was born on 22 January 1915. They returned to England in 1916 due to he war, and on 17 February 1917. Second Lieutenant Massey Lynch was killed on 4 April 1918 in the latter stages of Operation Michael, the first phase of the German Spring Offensive. After the war Second Lieutenart Massey Lynch's body was recovered and he was buried as an unknown Officer of 3rd Dragoon Guards in Cruclific Corner Cemetery, in Villersentoneux. In August 1918, the Canadian Corps conducted the first burials at the Commonwealth War Graves Commission's Crucifis. Corner Cemetery, Originally consisting only of burials in Piot J. Rows A-D, and Fench burials in Piot J. Piot II, the cometerly was greatly enlarged after the Armistice with the concentration of casualities from the battlefields between the Somme and the Luce. It is in this area that Second Lieutenant Massey Lynch was found.

Après la guerre les restes de Second Lieutenant Massey Lynch ont été recouperé et enteré à Chucilis Corner Cemetery à Villers-Bretonneux comme un officier inconnu du 3º Dragoon Guards.
