Private James McNeilage McLean 1891 – 1915

James was born in 1891 to Donald and Agnes McLean and was the third oldest of twelve children. He was born, grew up and served his apprenticeship in Old Klipatrick, where he worked as a shipwright for Napier & Miller. His father was a marine engineer as well, a tradition which continued in the family down to recent generations.

James was living at his grandparent's house in Invergordon when he joined the Gordon Highlanders. At some point, his family moved to nearby Duntocher, where he is commemorated on the local war memorial. James was killed on the 23 September 1915, during the Battle of Loos.

The Commonwealth War Graves Commission's Fosse 7 Milliary Cemetery (Quality Streed) was begun by French troops in May 1915 and carried on by British units from June 1915 to April 1917. The cemetery takes its name 'Quality Street' from the trench which led into the cemetery, Private McLaen was buried here by his corrades, alongside those from the same Battalion who were killed in the nearby front line during September 1915.

The Commonwealth War Graves Commission cares for the graves, memorials, records and memory of the 1.7 million Commonwealth servicemen and women who died during the two World Wars.

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
