

We are in receipt of unofficial information about Capt. F.H. Cherry. 7th Machine Can Coy, A.I.F., in which some light is thrown on the circumstances of his death.

Ho. 1505 Pte G. Berson of the same Unit, who on May 11th was in the 5rd London General Hospital, Wendsworth, says that Capt. Cherry was Milled by a shell while in a dug-out, and that he was buried with military honours near Legnicourt. He describes him as clean shaven, dark and of medium height, and build, and about 25 years of age.

"I know that Capt. Cherry was killed in a dug-out by a shell we had a brigade parade of Officers and our senior officers went to his funeral. Capt. Cherry was buried with military honours, near Lagnicourt. Capt. Cherry was very popular, had just been transferred to 26th Batt."

Pte J. A. Gricks, of the same unit, when in the 5ml Australian Auxiliary Hospital, Dartford, reported that Capt. Cherry was killed by a bursting shell while in his dugout near mi Lagracourt. He was award a the V.C. after his death and was a native of Tasmania, of fresh complexion and medium height.

Downs reported that Capt. Cherry was killed on March 26th just after the capture of Lagencourt Village. He was killed instantly by a 5.9 shell, while in his dugout and his grave which is at the rear of Lagencourt, is marked by a cross bearing his name and particulars. Lt. Hay also stated that Capt. Cherry had been awarded the V.C. for valour.

443 Pte Wm. Hilder, gives similer evidence.

We have made an application to the Graves Registration Bureau for a photograph of his grave, which, if the latter is registered by that Society, will be sent in due course direct to his Next of Kin.

We have now closed the inquiry but will send you any further information, that we receive.
