Lance Corporal Owen James Munday

Lance Corporal Owen James Munday was born in Stockhridge in Hampshire in 1892. He was one of eight children born to Henry Munday and his second wife Ellen Harriett Lucas. He loined 11/18 Battain The Hampshire Yeonanny (Carabiners), before that battalion The Hampshire Yeonanny (Carabiners), before that battalion merged with 15° Battalico The Hampshire Regiment on 27 September 1911. In the summer of 1918, just weeks before his death, he married Florence Metcalf in Fasthourne.

By October 1918 the static fighting associated with the Western Front, which had kept the British Army in Belgium within the Yorse Salient since 1914, had lifted, and allied forces were advancing, or 19 October 1918 the town of Korrijk was liberated. During the days that followed 15th (Hampshire Yoromanny) Battaion The Hampshire Regiment, flogight eastwards from village to village as the advance continued, it was during this fighting that Lance Corporal Munday was tell on 22 October 1918, just weeks before the end of the First World War. He was 25 years of age.

Until now Lance Corporal Munday was recorded as missing as he had no known grave and he was commemorated on the Tyne Cot Memorial. However, new research has shown that he is buried in Heselent Military Cemetery, Today we will remember Lance Corporal Munday and his grave will be rededicated.

The village of Heestert was taken by Commonwealth forces towards the end of October 1918. During 1919, the Burgomaster issued instructions for the creation of the Burgomaster issued instructions for the creation of the Commonwealth War Graves Commission's Heestert Military Cemetery, which was made when the farmers of the Commune cleared their farms of Commonwealth and German battlefield graves from the October and November fighting, Later, three further graves were brought in from Moen Churchyrde.
